Maidenhead: Green light to draft Neighbourhood Plan

Major progress in representation

The Maidenhead Neighbourhood Forum has been given the go ahead to start preparing a draft Neighbourhood Plan to help guide future development across Maidenhead's unparished areas.

Neighbourhood Plans allow communities to put in place planning policies for a specific neighbourhood area, adding detail to the policies already set in the Borough Local Plan, and are used to help decide planning applications.

It follows an application for official designation by MNF last year, which was followed by a six-week consultation on the group's proposals.

Now that the council's planning department has given the thumbs up following

Proposals for a neighbourhood plan for Maidenhead took one step closer to fruition last week after Maidenhead Neighbourhood Forum was given the go ahead to start creating a blueprint for localised planning policy in unparished areas.

'overwhelming support', MNF can now begin the process of community engagement and consultation to shape a draft Neighbourhood Plan covering the wards of Belmont, St Mary's, Riverside, Furze Platt, Pinkneys Green, Boyn Hill and Oldfield.

Councillor Phil Haseler, cabinet member for planning, parking, highways and transport, said: "We would like forward to continuing to work to thank everyone who shared

your views in this consultation, which the planning department has carefully considered alongside the national legal requirements in making this positive decision on the group's proposals.

"This decision is purely to give the green light to the proposals put forward by the community group to designate Maidenhead's seven unparished wards as one neighbourhood and formally designate the group itself as the neighbourhood forum to lead the neighbourhood planning process for the area.

"The forum's role now is to engage widely with the rest of the community to prepare a draft Neighbourhood Plan, which will itself be subject to public consultation and independent examination. We look with and support the group

during the next stage of the process."

Andrew Ingram, chair of the forum, said: "MNF will be holding an initial public engagement session before Easter, when all members of the forum area (people who live or work within the seven unparished wards of Maidenhead) will have their opportunity to have a say about what they think would help


make the town a better place in the future.

"To develop and deliver a draft Neighbourhood Plan which will eventually be voted on in a local referendum, MNF will need help.



Survey 'supports forum proposal'

Maidenhead: Group wants neighbourhood plan for town

Maidenhead Neighbourhood Forum has found that more than three-quarters of respondents disagree with splitting the town into several neighbourhood plans.

The survey was launched after the Royal Borough dismissed a draft submission of a proposed plan by the forum as 'not appropriate' and said it 'would be useful to understand what conversations [and] consultation has taken place to support this designation'.

The draft plan, proposed last year, sought to cover seven unparished wards in the town under one neighbourhood plan, and is designed to set out planning policy in further detail and on a more local level than the Borough Local Plan.

ports our belief that the town of Maidenhead is both rational and appropriate as an area for a neighbourhood plan, particularly since Maidenhead will be allocated 70 per cent of the new homes in the borough.

"The residents' responses differ from the RBWM advice, and we have asked for a meeting with RBWM to discuss.

A spokesperson for the Royal Borough said: "Planning officers have been offering informal advice to the forum on justifying a suitable neighbourhood plan



"WHAT ABOUT THE INFRASTRUCTURE??"


With the population of Maidenhead set to rise by around 40% over the next ten years, people often ask about the plans for new infrastructure to support this growth – schools, surgeries, roads etc. The plans are to be found in RBWM's Infrastructure Delivery Plan if you know where to look, but it's a lengthy and complex document.

So the Forum has created this series of short summaries to help residents understand what is planned.

Next steps – how we start moving




The whole process - outline



Deliverables from Engagement and Scope

- A record of what local people want planning policies on
 - This is a key part of the engagement
- A filtered list of policy topic candidates
 - MNF will need to assess the ideas to see what could be in scope
- Possible topic groups to develop policies
 - o It would make sense to group the policy candidates into related topics
- A view of what MNF can realistically resource
 - We can only move forward where MNF members are willing to do the work



What do policies do?



Funding and support

- Our source of funding has been a grant from Locality of £5500
- Any money unspent by 31-Mar-23 has to be returned to Locality
 - o ..and money we do spend has to be on things taking place up to 31-Mar-23
- So we're aiming to have a public engagement meeting on 30-Mar
 - This meeting will require posters, leaflets, venue hire...
- After 31-Mar we'll need to apply for a new grant
 - o ..assuming Locality makes Neighbourhood Planning grants available again
- There is also money available via RBWM, but..
 - The part available now would have to be spent by 31-Mar-23
 - The major part of £20,000 is only available when the plan goes to referendum much later on



- Planned date 30-Mar-23
 - Set by funding constraints
 - o Format: Presentation and ideas workshop

Public engagement – then what?



Analysis of responses

- Collect what people said, at meeting & online
- Apply the filtering process
- Structure and group what comes out
- Look at likely resourcing, form groups

Distribute findings

- Public should know the outcome
- Engage those interested in specific topics
